



INSIGHT ABOUT PRAGMATICS AND DISCOURSE ANALYSIS

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Abstract:

As it is known that pragmatics and discourse analysis are so interrelated that it is difficult to distinguish the limit of each or between them therefore they can be considered sister disciplines. The present study is an attempt to investigate the relationship between the two and find out their similarities, and differences. So, the study of discourse seems not to fall outside the realm of pragmatics but it is seen as a complementary part of it.

1. Introduction:

Sometimes, Pragmatics and discourse analysis are considered interdisciplinary because they share some traits of language that are context-dependent. These include some recent trends such as discourse pragmatics and critical pragmatics.

2. Pragmatics:

Levinson (1983: 1) proposes that utilizing the term pragmatics is devised by the philosopher Charles Morris betokening a subsection of semiotics (1938). In traditional semiotics, the syntax is interested in the official relations among signs while semantics, is concerned with the relations between signs and the objects they signify, but pragmatics looks for the relations between signs and their users. Yule (1996:3), points that the analysis of meaning expressed by a speaker and understood by a listener is pragmatics. Thus, it is possible to say that pragmatic analyses are widely concerned with what people convey by using certain utterances than with what the words in those utterances may mean in isolation. It is worth mentioning that in pragmatics, meaning is not considered to be as stable as linguistic forms. On the contrary, it is dynamically created in the course of employing language (Verschueren, 1999: 11). According to Mey (2001: 6), a genuine pragmatic account should treat the language users in their social context; it cannot confine itself to those grammatically encoded aspects of context. Broadly speaking, pragmatics is concerned with those facets of meaning that are context-variable. It endeavors to widen the scope of traditional linguistics by housing many issues and aspects that characterize language in use (Horn and Kecskes, 2013: 356) It is stated that certain events contribute to the emergence of pragmatics. These include: first, the innovation of speech act theory by Austin (1962) with its subsequent development by Searle, second, the appearance of Grice's (1975) notion of the cooperative principle supported by four maxims which can be infringed to generate conversational implicatures. Finally, the introduction of Sperber and Wilson's Relevance theory which is a developed version of Grice's theory (ibid: 357).

3. Discourse Analysis:

Discourse is a term that repetitively utilized in a wide range of setting. It tends to be commonly utilized with text to show longer pieces of composed or communicated in language. Additionally it might allude to the semantic portrayal of some associated sentences, or it could allude to different correspondences on a particular issue, e. g. basic freedoms talk (Fetzer, 2014: 35). In this way, talk examination is feasible to be deciphered in various assorted manners and can likewise be led in various designs. These incorporate eliminating uncertainty, indicating referents, and recognizing

conversational implicature. By and by, different sorts of setting can be recognized. One sort is assigned as phonetic setting or the co-text. The co-text of a specific word alludes to any remaining words that happen inside the very expression or sentence. It has an amazing impact on working out the importance of a specific word. 6. Discourse Pragmatics:

This sort of study shows where the two fields being referred to meet. With respect to interactional talk pragmatics, Verschueren (1999: 7) views it as an intellectual, social and social way to deal with semantic wonders. 7. Trends in Pragmatics:

Horn and Kecskes (2013: 366) accept that pragmatics is principally an expression based field. Therefore, three distinct ways to deal with pragmatics have arisen. The main methodology is alluded to as pragma-semantics. It is sought after by the inheritors of Paul Grice and various researchers with a referential-coherent foundation and with different levels of obligation to truth-conditionality. It focuses on the development of significance through intellectual and formal models (de Saussure, 2007: 2).

A subsequent pattern, marked pragma-discourse, tries to stand out to the dialogic idea of connection through focusing on the possibility that interactants are entertainers who both demonstration and respond. Thus, the speaker-listener deciphers as well as responds to the next interactant's expression. The dialogic rule distinguishes exchange as a chain of activities and responses (Horn and Kecskes, 2013: 366). Another pattern is pragma-talk which goes past the expression and shows an extraordinary thought to socially decided semantic conduct. It tends to be expected that the pivotal distinction between pragmatics appropriate and talk is that though the previous focuses on individual utterances (organized set of words) in setting, the last spotlights on a coordinated arrangement of expressions (in the same place). The connection between the segments of expressions and the segments of talk is fairly comparative. It is accepted that talks, very much like expressions, have properties of their own. 8. Speech Acts and Conversation:

The idea of discourse act is first presented by Austin (1962), and afterward created by Austin's understudy, Searle (1969). In his book, How to Get things done with Words, Austin (1962) suggests that while articulating certain expressions speakers play out specific activities. As indicated by Austin, there are three sorts of act that an expression performs: locutionary act, illocutionary act, and prelocutionary act. Notwithstanding, he limits his utilization of the term discourse act to allude only to the second sort of act, I. e illocutionary act (Levinson, 1983: 236) As indicated by Moeschler (1998: 2), there exists a contention among rationalists and language specialists concerning the extending of discourse act hypothesis to talk examination. The pith of this contention is the possibility that discussion comprises of a progression of discourse acts. This contention is as per the following: "Discourse acts are not detached moves in correspondence: they show up in more worldwide units of correspondence, characterized as discussions or talks." in such manner, Van Dijk (1977: 213) states that

discourse acts ordinarily happen in arrangements, for example, a declaration followed by a clarification or expansion, an attestation followed by a revision or elective, or an affirmation followed by a forswearing or logical inconsistency. For instance: I need cash. Would you be able to loan me 1,000 dollars? In the model over, the primary discourse act is executed to build up conditions for the accompanying discourse act. It very well may be said that the previous gives motivation to the last mentioned. Thus, it might adjust the setting of correspondence such that the discourse demonstration of solicitation becomes fitting as well as an ordinary demonstration (Van Dijk, 1980:185). Additionally, Ferrara (1980: 234) says that discourse acts usually happen in arrangement where they are given through speakers who are engaged with rule-administered acts like discussing, making discussion, proposing bills in parliament and such. For example: There are thirty individuals in here. Could you open the window? The expression above is feasible to be conveyed in a stodgy study hall by means of somebody close to enough to another person sitting by the window. Here, the speaker's key objective is to get the window open while his auxiliary objective is to supply a decent support for the solicitation (on the same page: 235). It merits underscoring that the discourse act successions referred to above are delivered by lone speakers, yet it is workable for arrangements of discourse acts to be given by various speakers as in discussion. For this situation, such arrangements are alluded to as contiguousness sets. The idea of 'contiguousness sets' is initially presented by Schegolff and Sacks (1973:73-74). Models are question-answer, welcoming hello, demand acknowledgment, and so forth As indicated by Coulthard (1985: 70), nearness sets are basic underlying fixings in trades since they can be utilized for starting and closing a discussion. 9. Conversational Implicature:

Brown and Yule (1983: 31) notice that the term implicature is received by Grice (1975) to manage those parts of implying that a speaker infers past what he in a real sense states. As per Mey (2001: 450), this word is gotten from the action word to suggest. Subsequently, a conversational implicature alludes to something that is left implanted in discussion. That is the reason pragmatics is worried about implicatures. As per Levinson (1983: 101) Grice proposes four fundamental proverbs directing the endeavor of discussion, which together pass on a wide helpful guideline. (in the same place) The conversational sayings supporting the helpful standard incorporate the adages of value, amount, pertinence, and way. As per Grice (1975: 49) referred to in Eemeren and Grootendorst (1984: 120), it is expected that conversationalists submit to these sayings when they are occupied with a conversational experience. In any case, they regularly penetrate them to embroil a secret importance, i. e. implicature, as in: Johnny: Hello Sally how about we play marbles?

Johnny's Mom: How is your schoolwork getting along Johnny? In this occasion, Johnny's mom abuses the proverb of significance to pass on an extra importance. She reminds her child that he may not yet be allowed to play marbles (Levinson, 1983: 111). As indicated by Sauerland and Schumacher (2015: 6), when speakers plan to communicate a specific importance, they typically utilize different parts which go past the phonetic capacities. In any case, audience members are fairly familiar with the different components speakers resort to and accordingly regularly prevail with regards to uncovering the significance the speaker wishes to pass on. 10. Presuppositions:

Crystal (2003: 410) contends that a presupposition alludes to something assumed by a speaker while expressing a particular sentence in connection to what exactly is unequivocally expressed. Extensively talking, speakers routinely define their messages relying upon the assumptions in regards to what their listener beforehand knows. Such assumptions are feasible to not be right, however they decide quite a bit of what

speakers say in their real language use (Yule, 1985:100). Sbisà (1999: 8) recommends that even minded presuppositions allude to the suppositions shared by the speaker and listener which comprise the foundation of their progressing talk. A portion of these common foundation presumptions have etymological markers or triggers. In pragmatics, two significant kinds of presupposition are talked about: regular and practical presupposition. The previous is less dependent on setting than the last mentioned and is normally tied up to explicit etymological structures. For example, would you like some espresso? Proposes that espresso is now arranged. In any case, commonsense presuppositions are setting subordinate and emerge from the utilization of an expression in a particular setting (Paltridge, 2006: 60). Before that, Yule (1996: 27-28) proposes that there are three sorts of presupposition: existential, lexical and underlying. Existential presuppositions are related with clear portrayals, lexical presuppositions are those emerged by specific structures like factive action words, and underlying presuppositions are connected to explicit syntactic designs like separated developments. With respect to talk examination, Polyzou (2014: 123) states that presuppositions are at present used in the basic ways to deal with talk investigation. It is demonstrated that they are definitive to uncover naturalized belief systems hidden talk, and examine manipulative elements of talk, especially techniques making it socially or intellectually hard to challenge philosophical assumptions.

11. Reference:

Reference is an idea which is vital to talk investigation since it is an essential importance of printed union and lucidness. In such manner, Halliday and Hasan (1970: 31) suggest that attachment can be given by connections including reference. They affirm that in each language there exist explicit things having the property of reference. 12. Amenability:

As per Paltridge (2006: 72), neighborliness is a space of pragmatics that is of worry to individuals keen on taking a gander at language from a talk viewpoint. It is suggested that good manners and face are significant for understanding why individuals choose to make statements with a specific goal in mind in spoken and composed talk. The most compelling work in amiability hypothesis is Earthy colored and Levinson's (1987). They affirm that their thought of face depends on that of Goffman's (1967) and the English people idea of face, which ties up with ideas of being humiliated, embarrassed or losing face. Face alludes to the public mental self view that each individual wishes to keep up for himself. Their idea of face is separated into positive and negative face. For Earthy colored and Levinson, affableness is the impression of regard of the questioner's face. In relational correspondence, members wish to support each other's face, and need to shield it at whatever point it is undermined. The basic supposition that will be that face is powerless. That is, a few demonstrations are undermining social amicability and consequently including relaxing or relief through a wide range of semantic systems (Geyer, 2008:16). Beforehand, Lakoff (1973) proposes a conversational-proverb way to deal with respectfulness. 13. Impoliteness:

As far as he might be concerned, lack of consideration is a lot of the parasite of pleasantness. Bousfield (2008: 72) considers rudeness as the wide inverse of graciousness. That is, while good manners looks to alleviate face-threatening acts, lack of consideration comprises the correspondence of intentionally unnecessary and conflictive verbal face-undermining acts which are deliberately passed on. It is affirmed that characterizing discourteousness establishes a genuine test. This is because of the way that albeit a few practices are normally rude, they won't generally be so in all circumstances. In this manner, rudeness relies upon how one sees what is said and done and how that identifies with the circumstance (Culpeper, 2011: 22). Additionally, rudeness requires (a) a psychological disposition held by a member and involved negative assessment convictions about specific practices in certain social settings, and (b) the initiation of that mentality by those incontext practices. In light of what has been said, discourteousness can be characterized as a negative disposition towards explicit practices happening in explicit settings (in the same place: 23). For the fruitful presentation of lack of consideration, and as per Bousfield (2008:72), the expectation of the speaker to cause offense should be perceived by those in a beneficiary job. That is, lack of consideration doesn't happen where one as opposed to the two members plans/sees face-dangers. Concerning lack of consideration procedures, Culpeper (1996: 355-7) attempts to assemble a system for rudeness according to Brown and Levinson (1987) affableness techniques. Moreover, and as indicated by Van der Bom and Factory (2015: 188), verbose ways to deal with (im)politeness are a more limited, intuitive and setting focused type of examination which thinks about the communication between members, chooses longer pieces of talk for investigation, and focuses on the impression of individuals worried regarding what they take to be considerate and discourteous. Besides, such methodologies are more worried about philosophies of (im)politeness. That is, these methodologies stress the possibility that it is important to diagram the part of respectfulness and discourteousness as good and philosophical frameworks, as opposed to just assuming that conversationalists' amenability as a method of connoting their sympathy for other people.

14. Pragmatics and Argumentative Discourse:

Puig (2003: 3) specifies that argumentation has gotten a lot of consideration because of the way that it is unavoidable in cooperation where it decides the political, lawful and promoting talk genera. Bermejo-Luque (2011: 1) imagines that for the vast majority, argumentation is an ordinary and wherever direct as in it is standard to experience individuals engaged with the way toward giving and mentioning reasons. For Eemeren and Grootendorst (2004:1): "Argumentation is a verbal, social, and objective movement pointed toward persuading a sensible pundit of the worthiness of an outlook by advancing a heavenly body of suggestions defending or discrediting the recommendation communicated in the stance." At the sentence level, argumentation is viewed as comprising of rudimentary discourse acts having a place with the class of assertives. Conversely, at the printed level, the total group of stars of rudimentary discourse acts comprises the unpredictable discourse demonstration of argumentation (Henkemans, 2014: 43). From discourse act point of view, and as indicated by Eemeren and Grootendorst (1984: 47), the illocutionary act complex of argumentation is planned to persuade or convince the audience of the agreeableness of the speaker's assessment. Huber and Snider (2006: 3) says though influence can be characterized as the action of influencing the lead of mentalities of others, contention is the legitimate methodology of influence. In thinking about a procedure to persuade conversationalists through argumentation, the idea of talk direction is critical. It is suggested that talk direction assigns the development or course that speakers want to dole out to the understandable entire of discourse acts which they want to incite in their crowd. In that capacity, they attempt to control crowd by guiding them to the logical course which will serve the speakers' advantage best. They will achieve this informative point by proposing a methodology, choosing words and a specific talk development (Puig, 2003: 4).

15. Critical Discourse Analysis:

As indicated by Gem (2003: 149), basic talk examination alludes to a methodology that researches the connection which holds between discursal occasions and sociopolitical and social components especially the

way in which talk is philosophically influenced by force and ties in the public arena. Beforehand, Van Dijk (2001: 352) communicates this equivalent view as follows:

Thus, the work of the investigator is to investigate traces of belief systems and bias in messages.

16. Conclusions:
